Rabbi Dr. DAVID BERGER is Ruth and I. Lewis Gordon Professor of Jewish History and Dean of the Graduate School of Yeshiva University in New York City. Previously he was Professor of Jewish Studies at Brooklyn College and has written several volumes and essays on medieval Jewish-Christian relations.

Rabbi Dr. MICHAEL COOK is Sol and Arlene Bronstein Professor of Jewish-Christian Studies and Intertestamental and Early Christian Literature at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati. He has authored books and essays on Jewish-Christian relations.

Dr. PHILIP A. CUNNINGHAM is Professor of Theology and Director of the Institute for Jewish-Catholic Relations at St. Joseph's University in Philadelphia. Previously he headed the Institute for Christian-Jewish Learning at Boston College and he has authored essays and volumes on interreligious affairs.

Rabbi Dr. BARRY CYTRON is Professor of Jewish Studies and Jewish Chaplain at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota, and formerly directed the Jay Phillips Center in Interfaith Education at St. John's University and the University of St. Thomas in Minneapolis-St. Paul.

Dr. EUGENE FISHER is Distinguished Professor of Theology at St. Leo's University in Florida. He served for many years as the director of Catholic-Jewish relations for the US Conference of Catholic Bishops and as a *Consultor* to the Holy See. He authored numerous books and essays on Jewish-Catholic relations.

Fr. Dr. LAWRENCE E. FRIZZELL, S.T.L., is Director of the Institute of Judeo-Christian Studies and program director of the M.A. program and Professor of Judeo-Christian Studies at Seton Hall University in South Orange, New Jersey.

Rabbi Dr. IRVING GREENBERG served as Executive Director of the President's Commission on the Holocaust and Chairman of the U.S. Holocaust Museum Memorial Council and was a Professor of Jewish Studies at the City University of New York. He has authored books and essays on Jewish theology.

Dr. SUSANNAH HESCHEL is the Eli Black Professor of Jewish Studies at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire and has taught at Princeton University, the University of Capetown, the University of Edinburgh, and the University of Frankfurt and authored works on German-Jewish thought.

Rev. Dr. ALAN F. JOHNSON is Emeritus Professor of New Testament and Christian Ethics, Wheaton College, Illinois, Adjunct Professor of Christian Ethics, Wheaton Graduate School, and Emeritus Director of the Center for Applied Christian Ethics at Wheaton College.

Dr. EDWARD KESSLER, M.B.E., is the founder and Executive Director of the Woolf Institute and a fellow of St. Edmunds College, Cambridge, Great Britain. He has authored several volumes and numerous papers on interreligious affairs. He received the M.B.E. award from Queen Elizabeth II.

Rev. Dr. ANTONIOS KIREOPOULOS is Associate General Secretary for Faith and Order and Interfaith Relations at the National Council of Churches USA. Previously he was Executive Director of Religions for Peace USA and Special Assistant to the Greek Orthodox Archbishop of America.

Rabbi Dr. EUGENE KORN is the American Director of the Center for Jewish-Christian Understanding and Cooperation in Israel and author and editor of books and articles in the field of Jewish thought and ethics.

Rabbi Dr. RON KRONISH is founder and Director of the Interreligious Coordinating Council in Israel where has lived since 1979. He served as lecturer in education at Tel Aviv University and Hebrew University and has produced the film, "I Am Joseph Your Brother."

Rabbi Dr. SHIRA LANDER is Professor of Practice and Director of Jewish Studies at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas. Formerly Professor of Jewish Studies at Rice University, she also taught at St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore and authored the commentary on I Corinthians for the *Oxford Jewish Annotated New Testament*.

Msgr. GUY A. MASSIE is Pastor of Sacred Hearts/St. Stephen Parish in Brooklyn. He served as Catholic Chaplain at Brooklyn College and is Diocesan Ecumenical and Interfaith Chairman for the Diocese of Brooklyn and Queens.

Fr. Dr. JOHN T. PAWLIKOWSKI, O.S.M., is Professor of Social Ethics and Director of the Catholic-Jewish Studies Program at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. Author of numerous articles and books on Catholic-Jewish relations, he served as President of the International Council of Christians and Jews.

Dr. ELENA G. PROCARIO-FOLEY is Chairperson of the Religious Studies Department, Driscoll Professor of Jewish-Catholic Studies and Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Iona College in New Rochelle, New York. She is currently Associate Editor of *Horizons: The Journal of the College Theology Society*.

Rabbi Dr. DAVID ROSEN is the International Director of Interreligious Affairs of the American Jewish Committee and past President of the International Council of Christians and Jews. He was made a Knight Commander by Pope Benedict XVI and a Commander of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II.

Rabbi Dr. GILBERT S. ROSENTHAL is Director of the National Council of Synagogues. He served as a congregational rabbi for 33 years and Executive Vice President of the New York Board of Rabbis for 10 years. He has authored and edited 12 books and numerous articles on Jewish ideas and doctrines.

Rabbi Dr. DAVID SANDMEL is Director of Interfaith Affairs for the Anti-Defamation League. Previously, he held the Crown-Ryan Chair of Jewish Studies at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago and was Rabbi-Educator at Temple Sholom in Chicago.

Rabbi Dr. BYRON SHERWIN is Distinguished Service Professor and Vice President Emeritus at the Spertus Institute for Jewish Studies in Chicago and author and editor of numerous books and essays on Jewish theology. He was decorated by the Republic of Poland for his work in Christian-Jewish dialogue.

Rev. Dr. JOSEPH D. SMALL served as Director of the Office of Theology and Worship of the Presbyterian Church (USA) from 1989–2011. Currently he is Adjunct Professor at the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary and consultant on church relations to the Presbyterian Foundation.

Fr. Dr. LIAM TRACEY, O.S.M., S.L.D., is Professor of Liturgy and Director of Post-Graduate Studies at St. Patrick's College in Maynooth, Ireland. Currently, he serves as Review Editor of the *Irish Theological Quarterly*.

Dr. MICHAEL R. TRICE is Assistant Dean of Ecumenical and Interreligious Dialogue and Assistant Professor of Theology at Seattle University School of Theology and Ministry. He served as Associate Executive Director of Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations for the Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Fr. Dr. MURRAY WATSON is the cofounder of the Centre for Jewish-Catholic-Muslim Learning at King's University College, London, Ontario, and is a member of the Canadian Catholic-Jewish Consultation Commission. He is Academic Director of the Bat Kol Institute for Jewish Studies of the Sisters of Zion.

Dr. DEBORAH WEISSMAN settled in Israel in 1972 and has taught at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and directed a teachers training institute for Israeli high schools. She is the first woman President of the International Council of Christians and Jews.
