Peter Atkinson is the dean of Worcester. His publications include *Friendship and the Body of Christ* (SPCK, 2004) and *The Lion Encyclopedia of the Bible* (Lion, 2011).

Michael Brierley is the canon precentor of Worcester. He is the editor of *Public Life and the Place of the Church* (Ashgate, 2006) and the author of a dozen articles on the history of twentieth-century theology.

David Bryer is a lay canon of Worcester. He holds a doctorate in Middle Eastern studies from the University of Oxford, and was director of Oxfam from 1992 to 2001 and chair of Oxfam International from 2003 to 2008.

Georgina Byrne is a residentiary canon of Worcester and a chaplain to Her Majesty the Queen. She is the author of *Modern Spiritualism and the Church of England, 1850–1939* (Boydell, 2010).

Mark Chapman is the vice-principal of Ripon College Cuddesdon, professor of the history of modern theology at the University of Oxford, and canon theologian of Truro. His books include *Anglican Theology* (T. & T. Clark, 2012), *Theology and Society in Three Cities* (James Clarke, 2014), and, most recently, *Theology at War and Peace* (Routledge, 2017), on theology during the First World War.

Mark Dorsett has been the chaplain of the King's School, Worcester and a minor canon of Worcester since 1996. He was awarded a doctorate by the University of Birmingham for his thesis "The Church of England, the State, and Politics 1945–1983," and has published articles on the Church of England and twentieth-century public life.

John Inge is the bishop of Worcester, and lord high almoner to the Queen. He chairs the council for the archbishop of Canterbury's examination in theology, and his books include *A Christian Theology of Place* (Ashgate, 2003).

Robert Jones is the archdeacon of Worcester, and an honorary canon of Worcester. He studied German at Durham University, and is a member of the Meissen Commission, which is responsible for the relationship between the Church of England and the Evangelical Church in Germany.

Ilse Junkermann has been the bishop of the Evangelical Church in Central Germany (EKM) since 2009 and is the deputy lead bishop of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church of Germany (VELKD). She is an editor of the journal *Göttlinger Predigtmeditationen* (Vandenhoeck and Ruprecht) which provides theological resources for preaching.

Alvyn Pettersen is the canon theologian of Worcester. He is the author of *Athanasius and the Human Body* (Bristol Press, 1990) and *Athanasius* (Geoffrey Chapman, 1995).

Michael Snape is the inaugural Michael Ramsey professor of Anglican studies at Durham University, and a lay canon of Durham. The secretary of the Church of England Record Society, and the official historian of the Royal Army Chaplains' Department, he is the author of *God and the British Soldier* (Routledge, 2005) and co-editor of *The Clergy in Khaki* (Ashgate, 2013).

Andrew Studdert-Kennedy is the team rector and rural dean of Marlborough, an honorary canon of Salisbury, and the grandson of Geoffrey Studdert Kennedy.
