I never met Molly without enjoying it enormously. She had a warmth, an intellectual reach and sometimes a witty asperity which made her extremely good company.

I have always felt that her work, particularly on the Coleridge family, has been absurdly under-rated. As I told her, and as I wrote to her, her insight into Coleridge's marriage is second to none. Her perception of him as a man and a poet is intellectually formidable. She can be both critical and understanding on the same page. There is a full field of Coleridge scholars at the moment, but in my view Molly was in there first, and is still the outstanding one.

My only regret is that I did not see her more often. She certainly carved her place in the Newlands Valley as deeply as she wrote her name on the scroll of the great literary biographers.
